

This is the warned statement of Arthur TOPHAM taken on May 16th, 2012 by Det/Cst. Terry WILSON of BC Hate Crime Unit.

1 (Voices can be heard already speaking as they enter the room)
2
3 Arthur TOPHAM: ...I might try to run away or something.
4
5 DeUCst. WILSON: No, super, just have a seat right down there for me.
6 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
7
8 DeUCst. WILSON: We're gonna, I'm just gonna make sure we got everything going here.
9 Arthur TOPHAM: It looks like the same machine I got, is that a Sony?
10
11 DeUCst. WILSON: You've got the same digital one, you have?
12 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah that a Sony?
13
14 DeUCst. WILSON: Uh I don't know if this is- no this is an Olympus.
15 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh.
16
17 DeUCst. WILSON: Oh yeah (indecipherable) do you have an Olympus one as well?
18 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
19
20 DeUCst. WILSON: It works really well.
21 Arthur TOPHAM: Except I don't know how to stop it, and you know you record twenty
22 minutes...
23
24 DeUCst. WILSON: Yeah.
25 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and you want to type it out...
26
27 DeUCst. WILSON: Uh huh.
28 Arthur TOPHAM: ...you go five minutes, how do you stop it and then resume it again?
29
30 DeUCst. WILSON: Resume? I don't know.
31 Arthur TOPHAM: Can you do that?
32
33 DeUCst. WILSON: Because I tried to do that today.
34 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh.
35
36 DeUCst. WILSON: And I kept starting from the beginning, I was like- and I've heard this
37 four or five times, like I have no idea why, how you do that. And the
38 other thing is if you stop it as you're recording and start it again, it's a
39 brand new file on there, so it's not like it joins it together.

40 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, I know...
41
42 Det/Cst. WILSON: So it's like separate ones and then you gotta get somebody with a lot
43 bigger brain than I do to put 'em together, right?
44 Arthur TOPHAM: A pretty extensive manual comes with it.
45
46 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
47 Arthur TOPHAM: And I haven't had a chance to read it neither, and I've been taping all
48 of Jim TOWNSEND's calls from jail.
49
50 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
51 Arthur TOPHAM: And then all of a sudden I've got like thirty minutes here, yeah.
52
53 Det/Cst. WILSON: So do you put them all together on the computer? Like do you plug
54 this in with a USB port and keep all of that?
55 Arthur TOPHAM: No no no, I, I just have earphones...
56
57 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
58 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and then I type.
59
60 Det/Cst. WILSON: And, and listen to it off this thing?
61 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
62
63 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh well this thing has a...
64 Arthur TOPHAM: But you got- you can't type as fast.
65
66 Det/Cst. WILSON: Not fast enough, that's right.
67 Arthur TOPHAM: No you gotta stop it.
68
69 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
70 Arthur TOPHAM: And then when you stop it you gotta go back.
71
72 Det/Cst. WILSON: I think if you're able to download that, like if you're able to plug it in the
73 computer and you run it out of windows Media thing, then you're able
74 to stop it.
75 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh. I grew up on a Mac so I don't know.
76
77 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh.
78 Arthur TOPHAM: It probably works.
79
80 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mac's a little too complicated for me, its got good graphics and stuff
103 like that. So, so just so you know and, and we've already gone

82 through a lot of stuff, but I was the arresting officer earlier today, or
83 one of the arresting officers today. Another- Constable KAMIYA read
84 to you essentially a sheet, and you understand everything, do you
85 understand why you're under arrest? Maybe you can tell me what I
86 told you why you were arrested.
87 Arthur TOPHAM: Well my, say probably because you've assumed that some, for some
88 reason telling the truth is a crime and so therefore you're charging me
89 with a crime of so-called 'hate' or whatever.
90
91 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay, but did I tell you an actual charge, like a charge of the Criminal
92 Code? Did I, I told you the wilful promotion of hatred.
93 Arthur TOPHAM: This is from the Criminal Code, what's the section or what's the
94 numbers?
95
96 DeVCst. WILSON: 319(2).
97 Arthur TOPHAM: 319(2).
98
99 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah.
100 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
101
102 DeVCst. WILSON: So I told you that you're under arrest for wilful promotion of hatred.
103 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
104
105 DeVCst. WILSON: So that's the actual technical charging section, that's what it's called
106 okay. Urn and at that time we also gave you your, your rights to call
107 a lawyer.
108 Arthur TOPHAM: Mhm.
109
110 DeVCst. WILSON: And, and you've exercised those rights a couple of times. Right? You
111 talked to uhm
112 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, you exercised them for me.
113
114 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah.
115 Arthur TOPHAM: You called him.
116
117 DeVCst. WILSON: I called, I called him and you had an opportunity to talk to him in
118 private, a couple of times, two or three times.
119 Arthur TOPHAM: Weill don't assume it's private, you do. Or you tell me it is.
120
121 DeVCst. WILSON: I can tell you that's a private room so...
122 Arthur TOPHAM: I don't believe it, but anyways go ahead.
123

124 DeVCst. WILSON: But, but you were given your rights to call there. Right?
125 Arthur TOPHAM: I was given- yeah you gave me an opportunity to...
126
127 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah.
128 Arthur TOPHAM: ...to speak to my lawyer or a lawyer.
129
130 DeVCst. WILSON: And we told you at the time that, that anything you said to us was
131 gonna be audi- audio or video recorded.
132 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh yes.
133
134 DeVCst. WILSON: It was gonna be recorded in some fashion.
135 Arthur TOPHAM: That's right.
136
137 DeVCst. WILSON: And that will be used as evidence in court.
138 Arthur TOPHAM: That's right.
139
140 DeVCst. WILSON: The evidence doesn't necessarily-you, you used a term like 'You can
141 use it against me'. That's not what we're here for. Evidence is
142 evidence for us. So it doesn't have to be evidence against you, it
143 could be evidence for you that we produce to court as well, and I think
144 that's a difference a lot of people get mixed up.
145 Arthur TOPHAM: That would be a novelty wouldn't it? (Chuckles)
146
147 DeVCst. WILSON: So things you tell me doesn't necessarily have to be against you. If
148 you have stuff to tell me that can assist us in looking at the truth
149 please go ahead and tell us that too, right?
150 Arthur TOPHAM: It's all on my computer.
151
152 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay.
153 Arthur TOPHAM: You'll just have to sit down and read all the files with the Bnai Brith
154 and the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal.
155
156 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah.
157 Arthur TOPHAM: And the Canadian Human Rights - it's all on there, I've explained
158 everything from day one.
159
160 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay. So be- before we go any further, I told you it was gonna be
161 audio videoed. I told you that at some point we were gonna use that
162 material in court, right, we were gonna present whatever you told us
163 in court. You understand that, right?
164 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh I a hundred percent yeah.
165

166 Det/Cst. WILSON: So you understand your rights.
167 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
168
169 Det/Cst. WILSON: When I placed you in the cell area there was a couple of people that
170 you might have come in contact with. At one time there was another
171 officer that came down and helped you call- or Mr. CHRISTIE had
172 called in, and he escorted you to the phone booth. Do you remember
173 a different officer coming and essentially allowing you to call Mr.
174 CHRISTIE or Mr. CHRISTIE calling in and you talking to him a second
175 time?
176 Arthur TOPHAM: That was just after you...
177
178 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right.
179 Arthur TOPHAM: ...had spoke to me, yeah.
180
181 Det/Cst. WILSON: So there's times that you might come in contact with other police
182 officers or other officials in this building...
183 Arthur TOPHAM: Mmhm.
184
185 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...not me.
186 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
187
188 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay at no time do I want them to influencing you in talking to me right
189 now. So those people didn't promise you anything to talk to me right
190 now did they? Did they promise you anything?
191 Arthur TOPHAM: Did they promise me anything? No they just said they'd try to connect
192 me up with Mr. CHRISTIE.
193
194 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right. They didn't threaten you to, to talk to me did they? Did they tell
195 you if you didn't talk to me something was gonna happen to you?
196 Arthur TOPHAM: If I didn't talk to Mr. CHRISTIE something would happen?
197
198 Det/Cst. WILSON: No, if you didn't talk to me.
199 Arthur TOPHAM: I don't understand what you mean. Why would...
200
201 Det/Cst. WILSON: So did any...
202 Arthur TOPHAM: ...why would they say that?
203
204 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...I don't know but I gotta cover off the fact that nobody did that. I want
205 to make sure that you're talking with me here -
206 Arthur TOPHAM: They didn't discuss anything with me other than 'Would you come?
207 There's a call'.

208 Det!Cst. WILSON: Okay.
209 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
210
211 Det!Cst. WILSON: And you walked and talked to Mr. CHRISTIE. So outside of that
212 conversation you didn't have any other conversation?
213 Arthur TOPHAM: You're innocent or guilty.
214
215 Det!Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
216 Arthur TOPHAM: (indecipherable)
217
218 Det!Cst. WILSON: Okay. So now we got that sort of over, over and done with. The
219 process that's happened today since you were arrested is we've
220 executed a search warrant on your residence, for a series of articles.
221 I think I have a co- I'm hoping I've got a copy right here. Right. So
222 this copy is your copy, you've got your glasses there- perfect. So this
223 is your copy of the search warrant. And in here is what we, what we
224 searched for, and it is in connection with radicalpress.com.
225 Arthur TOPHAM: Right.
226
227 Det!Cst. WILSON: Okay? Which is a website that you run from your home. So we are
228 looking for material in relation to radicalpress.com.
229 Arthur TOPHAM: Why didn't you just get a hold of Bnai Brith?
230
231 Det!Cst. WILSON: Why didn't we get a hold of Bnai Brith? Why would we get a hold of
232 them?
233 Arthur TOPHAM: Well they've got it all.
234
235 Det!Cst. WILSON: They've got what all? What do they have?
236 Arthur TOPHAM: Well they got- well I don't know what they've got here but they've...
237
238 Det!Cst. WILSON: So...
239 Arthur TOPHAM: ...they've got any, anything that you've probably got is already in, in,
240 in you know, in the hands of the...
241
242 Det!Cst. WILSON: ...so would they...
243 Arthur TOPHAM: ...Human Rights Commission and in the, in the hands of uh...
244
245 Det!Cst. WILSON: So did they execute a search warrant to get that material?
246 Arthur TOPHAM: No I voluntary gave it to them.
247
248 Det!Cst. WILSON: Okay.
249 Arthur TOPHAM: I got nothin' to hide.

250 DeVCst. WILSON: So we want to separate that, that investigation that they did to the
251 investigation we did.
252 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
253
254 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay so we, it's standalone. Essentially separate.
255 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah you're (indecipherable) and they're...
256
257 DeVCst. WILSON: Well no no it's just they're different. We're dealing a criminal
258 investigation, and they had a Canadian human rights investigation.
259 So we want to keep them over there, so we can essentially do our
260 own investigation and look at it through objective eyes.
261 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh.
262
263 DeVCst. WILSON: Right?
264 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh! Well that's good.
265
266 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay.
267 Arthur TOPHAM: And we'll get some justice here eventually.
268
269 DeVCst. WILSON: Well we're hoping...
270 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
271
272 DeVCst. WILSON: ...we're hoping.
273 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
274
275 DeVCst. WILSON: So we've got a search warrant on your house, okay?
276 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
277
278 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah go ahead and read all about it.
279 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah it's not long...
280
281 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah go right ahead.
282 Arthur TOPHAM: ...just give me a sec here.
283
284 DeVCst. WILSON: No problem.
285 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay. Search warrant via telecommunication.
286
287 DeVCst. WILSON: So that essentially means that we- the search warrant we faxed it to
288 a justice of the peace centre in Burnaby.
289 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay. Corporal Normandie LEVAS and other peace officers
290 (indecipherable) on the oath of Corporal Normandie LEVAS, a peace

291 officer of Surrey. That there are reasonable grounds for dispensing
292 with and information presented personally.
293
294 Det/Cst. WILSON: So essentially she produced - Normandie is my, my partner, she
295 produced an affidavit...
296 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
297
298 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...justifying why we wanted to do a search warrant, so that's what the
299 oath part is in there.
300 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay so this doesn't identify who it was that got her to produce an
301 affidavit, she just doesn't go around producing affidavits for something
302 to do, she was directed to, to do this by someone?
303
304 Det/Cst. WILSON: No we - she's my partner as part of a criminal investigation. Who
305 would direct her to do this though, I don't understand your question.
306 Arthur TOPHAM: Well I'm, I'm, that's what I'm saying, who would?
307
308 Det/Cst. WILSON: No no, we are part of the BC Hate Crime Team.
309 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
310
311 Det/Cst. WILSON: We are an investigative body of the RCMP...
312 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
313
314 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...and we initiated this investigation.
315 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah but someone must have complained to you.
316
317 Det/Cst. WILSON: You're right, you're right, somebody did complain to us about your
318 website.
319 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
320
321 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah they didn't direct us in doing it, they just made a complaint
322 saying here's all your- here's radicalpress.com.
323 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh okay, yeah.
324
325 Det/Cst. WILSON: To look at that
326 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay so we're back to Harry ABRAMS again then. (Laughs) Okay
327 anyways that, that, there are reasonable grounds to believing that the
328 following offences have been committed; wilful promotion of hatred,
329 contrary to section - ...okay. And that there are reasonable grounds
330 for believing that the following items will afford evidence of the
331 offences; computers, laptops, smart phone or device that accesses
332 the internet, is capable of uploading and downloading, and all their

333 peripheral equipment, computer disks, drives or storage devices
334 which could be used to store information, and building records,
335 receipts and correspondence with ABC Communications and
336 networks, and any correspondence in the form of mail or physical
337 documents directed to radicalpress. Okay so that means you go,
338 you've taken all my computers.
339
340 Det/Cst. WILSON: We've taken your computers, um...
341 Arthur TOPHAM: Or computer, or, or what or did you ...
342
343 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...the computer, computers, it's my understanding- I wasn't there to
344 do the search...
345 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh.
346
347 Det/Cst. WILSON: ... I was here so if you needed something. But my understanding is
348 it's computers.
349 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
350
351 Det/Cst. WILSON: It's more than one.
352 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
353
354 Det/Cst. WILSON: It's my understanding that we've got several sort of jump drives and
355 stuff like that, other material that can hold electronic information that
356 you can...
357 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay, okay yeah, any, anything like that.
358
359 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...put on the internet. Anything like that. As well as the billing
360 information to ABC Communications, which is where you have that
361 registered domain name for radicalpress.
362 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
363
364 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay?
365 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
366
367 Det/Cst. WILSON: And I'm gonna explain to you, and Netfirm is the server.
368 Arthur TOPHAM: Host.
369
370 Det/Cst. WILSON: Is the host, right?
371 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah they're my host.
372
373 Det/Cst. WILSON: The United States ...

374 Arthur TOPHAM: No, well they're um, the, the headquarters is the States but they're in
375 Toronto.
376
377 DeUCst. WILSON: Like the server is in Toronto? I thought, I thought Netfirms was an
378 American company?
379 Arthur TOPHAM: Well it is but they have a- I mean everything comes out of here.
380
381 DeUCst. WILSON: So who holds your server? Who, what, where is your server that, that
382 holds the information?
383 Arthur TOPHAM: Well as far as I know it's, it's in Toronto.
384
385 DeUCst. WILSON: Like these-
386 Arthur TOPHAM: It's a Canadian thing. The American, you know the American ...
387
388 DeUCst. WILSON: Yeah.
389 Arthur TOPHAM: ...the, the headquarter's in the States.
390
391 DeUCst. WILSON: Yeah.
392 Arthur TOPHAM: But well I mean it might be, I don't know I -as far as I know...
393
394 DeUCst. WILSON: So who do you, who do you pay for that space? Like do you send it to
395 the Canadian company?
396 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
397
398 DeUCst. WILSON: Okay.
399 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
400
401 DeUCst. WILSON: And how much would you pay for a space like that? Like you hold a
402 whole server itself or ?
403 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh no no no, I just, you know you rent whatever you...
404
405 DeUCst. WILSON: A section of it?
406 Arthur TOPHAM: ...well you, yeah, you pay your ninety bucks a month or...
407
408 DeUCst WILSON: Yeah.
409 Arthur TOPHAM: ...oh no it's not that it's sixty some dollars every three months or
410 something ...
411
412 DeUCst. WILSON: Okay.
413 Arthur TOPHAM: ...for the hosting program.
414
415 DeUCst. WILSON: Right.

416 Arthur TOPHAM: But I'm pretty sure it's, it's in Canada.
417
418 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. Okay. Yeah no I, I thought the company was in the States
419 but...
420 Arthur TOPHAM: Well the, the main headquarters is.
421
422 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
423 Arthur TOPHAM: Because I, you know every time you, you, you know you go to get a
424 support ticket from them you always get a, an email from the
425 headquarters (indecipherable)
426
427 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh okay.
428 Arthur TOPHAM: ...saying 'Would you like to do a little survey?' or something.
429
430 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah, yeah.
431 Arthur TOPHAM: But when I phone and talk to technicians and everything they're all in
432 Toronto somewhere.
433
434 Det/Cst. WILSON: They're in Toronto?
435 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
436
437 Det/Cst. WILSON: I didn't know that. I thought if you phoned technicians you would get
438 somebody overseas. Like anything I've ever done...
439 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh no not- you're talking telephone now.
440
441 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...oh telephone yeah, that's right.
442 Arthur TOPHAM: (Laughs) You get somebody in Taiwan or somewhere. And that there
443 are reasonable grounds for believing that the said items or some parts
444 of them are in dwelling house and outbuildings of Arthur TOPHAM.
445 Okay, well okay.
446
447 Det/Cst. WILSON: So that just means, your dwelling house is where you live, and the
448 outbuildings are, are buildings that are not attached to your residence,
449 but are on the property of- what is it 4633...
450 Arthur TOPHAM: Barkerville Highway yeah.
451
452 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...yeah yeah.
453 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay. This is therefore to authorize and require you to enter the said
454 place between the hours of 17:00 on May 16th and 21:00 on May 16th
455 And upon entering to search for and seize the things and to report
456 thereon as soon - something in writing as practical, but within a

457 period of not exceeding seven days after the execution of the warrant
458 to a clerk, okay in Quesnel.
459
460 DeVCst. WILSON: Mmhm. So that simply means that we have to report to the justice of
461 the peace on the outcome of our search within seven days.
462 Arthur TOPHAM: To the justice of the peace here in Quesnel?
463
464 DeVCst. WILSON: The justice of the peace that swore to it.
465 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh okay.
466
467 DeVCst. WILSON: But it ends up to go the Quesnel court house. The justice of the
468 peace is actually in, in Burnaby, it's the way they do things now, but...
469 Arthur TOPHAM: Right.
470
471 DeVCst. WILSON: ...we report to the justice of the peace but all these documents will
472 eventually end up in the courthouse in, in Quesnel.
473 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
474
475 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay?
476 Arthur TOPHAM: And so are you going to give me back my computers?
477
478 DeVCst. WILSON: Not right now no.
479 Arthur TOPHAM: No- ...obviously not right now...
480
481 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah.
482 Arthur TOPHAM: ...you'll be busy for awhile.
483
484 DeVCst. WILSON: Yeah that, that's what essentially um, gonna be up to the courts.
485 When we seize an article we present it as evidence.
486 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
487
488 DeVCst. WILSON: And the courts make a decision about that. Mr. CHRISTIE's also
489 gonna give you some advice on how there's other options to get your
490 property back. And there's several different options in the Criminal
491 Code here that Mr. CHRISTIE is well versed in, that I think you know
492 you pay attention to. Okay he's gonna give you several options. I
493 can't do that, because I'm not your lawyer right?
494 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah I'm not, I'm not so concerned about that. I am concerned about
495 the fact that you know I got a mining business to run...
496
497 DeVCst. WILSON: Mmhm.
498 Arthur TOPHAM: ...with all my mining information in there.

499 DeVest. WILSON: Yeah.
500 Arthur TOPHAM: All my contacts and everything.
501
502 Devest. WILSON: Yeah I totally understand.
503 Arthur TOPHAM: I got two men working for me and all of that, what am I supposed to
504 do about that?
505
506 Devest. WILSON: Yeah I can totally understand that and unfortunately I don't have a
507 really great answer for you, besides the fact that the material on the,
508 some of the material on that computer it's my understanding is also
509 runs radicalpress.com. So right now we can't sever the two, it's one
510 machine right, your computer is one machine. And if you got this gold
511 minding stuff, we might have to look at..
512 Arthur TOPHAM: Well I've got that. I, I, I run the website for the eariboo Mining
513 Association ...
514
515 Devest. WILSON: Mmhm, yeah.
516 Arthur TOPHAM: ...all of that information's on there.
517
518 DeVest. WILSON: Yeah.
519 Arthur TOPHAM: I've got other websites that I run as well, all of that's on there.
520
521 Devest. WILSON: You run a chemtrail
522 Arthur TOPHAM: Why don't you just take the, why don't you take the stuff off from
523 radicalpress?
524
525 Devest. WILSON: And maybe that's an option for us but at this point we don't know if
526 that's an option because we don't know what it entails.
527 Arthur TOPHAM: Well it's all just in files, I'm sure you can pull the files off that are
528 related to radical press.
529
530 DeVest. WILSON: So what would we, how easy would it be able to pull off the radical
531 press stuff?
532 Arthur TOPHAM: Well you guys got technicians.
533
534 DeVest. WILSON: Well no no but I mean like for me when I look at my Windows
535 computer there's a file for Arthur TOPHAM, there's a file for - you
536 know what I mean?
537 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
538
539 DeVest. WILSON: Like is it as easy as taking that file off?
540 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.

541 Det/Cst. WILSON: So you keep everything in file folders
542 Arthur TOPHAM: But I'm sure you got people, you got people that know Macs.
543
544 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
545 Arthur TOPHAM: You know. You could just pull these things off.
546
547 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
548 Arthur TOPHAM: You can just download 'em.
549
550 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
551 Arthur TOPHAM: But I mean all my other stuff for my, my business and, and everything
552 else I mean...
553
554 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right. Okay.
555 Arthur TOPHAM: ...as I say, I can't, you can't put me in - you know I've got, I've got
556 equipment coming up here, I've got men waiting to go to work.
557
558 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
559 Arthur TOPHAM: I've got you know hundreds of thousands of dollars of investment here
560 in machinery.
561
562 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah. Yeah.
563 Arthur TOPHAM: And you can't just take all of that away from me and put me out of
564 business.
565
566 Det/Cst. WILSON: No no no, we're just gonna take it right now, and if there's options-
567 and I'm sure Mr. CHRISTIE's gonna give you options, in
568 communication with us. We don't want to put any hardship but we
569 need to get the evidence off there too.
570 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah well I said (indecipherable) do that.
571
572 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well there's a, there's a bit of a fine line here right?
573 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
574
575 Det/Cst. WILSON: So we've gotta sort of work that out. Right now we're just at such of
576 the infancy stages of getting that.
577 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
578
579 Det/Cst. WILSON: You know what I mean? So we don't want to make it a hardship on
580 you but we're gonna have to figure it out.
581 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah well I mean if you're smart enough to you know, find me out in
582 the Barkerville Highway I'm sure you've got people in your department

624 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah I don't understand why the Massad would come over and train
625 me.
626 Arthur TOPHAM: Well you may learn about it by the time the trial's over.
627
628 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well I've had lots of...
629 Arthur TOPHAM: Pay attention.
630
631 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...I've had lots of hate crime trials in seventeen years of doing it and...
632 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
633
634 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...I haven't quite figured that out yet so...
635 Arthur TOPHAM: Is that right eh? Are they all related to the same folks here, this
636 Jewish population, or are they got to do with something else?
637
638 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well I've had hate crime files I've done from white people to black
639 people, to Jewish people, to gay and lesbian people, to everybody,
640 right?
641 Arthur TOPHAM: Who created the Hate Crimes Unit.
642
643 Det/Cst. WILSON: The Provincial government and the RCMP in British Columbia, so...
644 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
645
646 Det/Cst. WILSON: Who do you think created the Hate Crime Team?
647 Arthur TOPHAM: Hmm?
648
649 Det/Cst. WILSON: Who do you think created the Hate Crime Team?
650 Arthur TOPHAM: Read all about it, when they download it all.
651
652 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well I've read a lot of your...
653 Arthur TOPHAM: I've been up since five o'clock this morning.
654
655 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
656 Arthur TOPHAM: I don't know how long you've been checking me out...
657
658 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
659 Arthur TOPHAM: ...but if you've uh...
660
661 Det/Cst. WILSON: We'll have read a lot on your website.
662 Arthur TOPHAM: Mmhm.
663

664 Det/Cst. WILSON: And there's some interesting stuff that you have very creatively done.
665 Very creatively, like very creatively. The, the Israel Must Perish book
666 is extremely creative, in a book from 1923.
667 Arthur TOPHAM: Well it's not a book it's a parody.
668
669 Det/Cst. WILSON: It's a parody.
670 Arthur TOPHAM: It's not a, it's not a book.
671
672 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well but the, but the Germany Must Perish is not a parody.
673 Arthur TOPHAM: Well the original book written by the, by the Jew in 1942 or whatever,
674 that was a book.
675
676 Det/Cst. WILSON: 192-
677 Arthur TOPHAM: Hmm?
678
679 Det/Cst. WILSON: 1932 wasn't it?
680 Arthur TOPHAM: No.
681
682 Det/Cst. WILSON: No? '42?
683 Arthur TOPHAM: He wrote it just after the second world war started, yeah.
684
685 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
686 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah. 'Cause they had to create all this kind of hatred towards
687 Germany eh, because most of the people in the States you know
688 didn't have a big hard on for Germans.
689
690 Det/Cst. WILSON: So you have this German book that it was created sixty some odd
691 years ago.
692 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, Germany Must Perish, by KAUFMANN.
693
694 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah, that's it, I think Mr. KAUFMANN.
695 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, so all I did was change the title and make it out like, and use
696 the - it was the same thing just change Nazi to Zionist or whatever,
697 Jew or whatever it was in...
698
699 Det/Cst. WILSON: German to Jew.
700 Arthur TOPHAM: ..yeah, but I mean I didn't, I didn't write a book or nothing.
701
702 Det/Cst. WILSON: No.
703 Arthur TOPHAM: It was just an article but a lot of people thought it was a real book.
704
705 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah. So it's not a real book, it's not like you bound or...

706 Arthur TOPHAM: No!
707
708 Det/Cst WILSON: ...went through the whole book and did it?
709 Arthur TOPHAM: Where the hell would I have money to do that?
710
711 Det/Cst WILSON: Because, because when you read the- I've read Israel Must Perish,
712 I've read Germany Must Perish, I've read it all on your thing. Like it's
713 fairly, you know it's not a one page or paragraph parody, you go into
714 extreme detail talking about...
715 Arthur TOPHAM: All that is what, all that is what KAUFMANN wrote, all I did was
716 change Nazi to, to uh Jew, or else to Zionist
717
718 Det/Cst WILSON: Mmhm.
719 Arthur TOPHAM: All, none of the text was mine. that was all from the original book of
720 KAUFMANN's.
721
722 Det/Cst WILSON: Well except the text about um, the introduction that you put in there.
723 essentially it says that it's calling for the, the um, the extinction of the
724 Jewish race.
725 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, and that's exactly what they were calling for the German race.
726
727 Det/Cst WILSON: Mmhm.
728 Arthur TOPHAM: Alii did was change the words from, from, from German to Jewish.
729
730 Det/Cst WILSON: Okay.
731 Arthur TOPHAM: I never- all the rest of the test isn't, isn't anything I wrote it was in the,
732 it was in the Jews book, the first one.
733
734 Det/Cst WILSON: So let me get this, if I remember correctly, the original text is there ...
735 Arthur TOPHAM: Weill got the original book at home, I'm sure they grabbed a copy of
736 it
737
738 Det/Cst WILSON: ...okay, I don't know, I don't think they did. We took a lot of pictures
739 of stuff you had. we didn't take all your stuff, right?
740 Arthur TOPHAM: I hope you didn't take all my library.
741
742 Det/Cst WILSON: Yeah we didn't take all your library.
743 Arthur TOPHAM: Were you up there?
744
745 Det/Cst WILSON: We took some pictures. No no no, my, my partners -my
746 understanding is we didn't take a lot of stuff from your house. We
747 took a lot of pictures but we didn't take a lot of stuff.

748 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
749
750 Det/Cst. WILSON: But my understanding from Israel Must Perish is, is, like although
751 you've changed German and Nazi to Jew and Zionist, it goes all the
752 way through the book. Like, like it goes...
753 Arthur TOPHAM: No, not the whole book no. No there's just excerpts.
754
755 Det/Cst. WILSON: No but...
756 Arthur TOPHAM: Alii did was take some of the juicier experts that KAUFMANN wrote
757 about Germany...
758
759 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
760 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and then...
761
762 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right.
763 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and then just switched the, the one word. I never wrote any of the
764 text of it.
765
766 Det/Cst. WILSON: Because there, there's whole sections about the whole plan of
767 castrating ...
768 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
769
770 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...instead of shooting because it costs more money and that sort of
771 stuff.
772 Arthur TOPHAM: All in the original book.
773
774 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. But when you look at other sections of your website, such as-
775 let's pick, let's pick another one, the Protocols of Zion.
776 Arthur TOPHAM: Mhm.
777
778 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right? The Protocols of the Elders of Zion. That is put on your
779 website by you.
780 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
781
782 Det/Cst. WILSON: You actually have an Editors note where your old server, it's my
783 understanding -took it off and then you put it in four different parts on
784 your, on your website or ?
785 Arthur TOPHAM: No. No no. No, I forget what happened there. I think it, the old one
786 I got so much spam and the program was so old that they, what they
787 did was they just flooded my website with so much spam that it shut
788 it down.
789

790 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh.
791 Arthur TOPHAM: So I had to restart it, that's why I think it shows 2006 as the beginning
792 of the website now. But you go on there...
793
794 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh I see, yeah.
795 Arthur TOPHAM: ...the first article starts in 200(indecipherable).
796
797 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right, so you have essentially the running chronology of urn, of your
798 website on the right hand side.
799 Arthur TOPHAM: Weill lost, I lost five or six years.
800
801 Det/Cst. WILSON: So yeah, so the right hand side starting in 2006 that's your website,
802 the running chronology.
803 Arthur TOPHAM: The second time I started it up yeah.
804
805 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
806 Arthur TOPHAM: Because they managed to screw it up the first time by spamming me.
807
808 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
809 Arthur TOPHAM: Spamming me so much.
810
811 Det/Cst. WILSON: So the Protocols of Zion, it's my under- from when, when I read it, it's
812 a fictitious account of this meeting that these Zionists have. But for
813 some reason it's portrayed by people like yourself that it's an actual
814 real meeting, it's a real.
815 Arthur TOPHAM: No I don't portray it, it's just a roadmap for what they planned for the
816 twentieth century, and you're a perfect example of it and what you're
817 recording right now is a perfect example of what their plans were.
818 Have you read it yourself?
819
820 Det/Cst. WILSON: I have.
821 Arthur TOPHAM: Well?
822
823 Det/Cst. WILSON: So where would I fit into that section? Where would I fit in this?
824 Arthur TOPHAM: You can't, you can't put two and two together after reading that?
825
826 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well I can put two and two together, but I still see that as a fictitious
827 book.
828 Arthur TOPHAM: Why?
829
830 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't see that as a real plan.
831 Arthur TOPHAM: Written in 1896...

832 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
833 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and everything they projected back then is happening now, and yet
834 you think it's fictitious?
835
836 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
837 Arthur TOPHAM: Why would you think it's fictitious?
838
839 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't know. Why do you think it's the truth maybe?
840 Arthur TOPHAM: Well because it's a reality, it's happening right now.
841
842 Det/Cst. WILSON: So give me an example of what they, they talked about, that comes
843 (indecipherable)?
844 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh Listen I try, like I said, I've been working long days okay.
845
846 Det/Cst. WILSON: I bet.
847 Arthur TOPHAM: I'm tired, I don't want to get into it.
848
849 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
850 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay?
851
852 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well...
853 Arthur TOPHAM: You know maybe sometime after it's all over...
854
855 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
856 Arthur TOPHAM: ...over a beer or something or...
857
858 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
859 Arthur TOPHAM: I haven't got the energy right now.
860
861 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well my, my difficult is, is that when I look at your website it is in
862 totality an anti-zionist website, like...
863 Arthur TOPHAM: I cover a lot of articles besides Zionists.
864
865 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well I see, I see you've got the, the Jim TOWNSEND stuff on your
866 website, you know on his incarceration right now, right?
867 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
868
869 Det/Cst. WILSON: And a dislike for the RCMP, or at least his view of dislike for the
870 RCMP.
871 Arthur TOPHAM: Same sort of thing as you're doing here, you know, you'll take exc..
872 excerpts of things, take them out of place, out of context like they did
873 to Jim, and then stick him in jail. He'll, he tries to file a, a complaint to

874 the RCMP and they turn around and, and file charges against him, I
875 mean it's all just- that's all part of the protocols, think about it.
876
877 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. How, again I'm not too sure where that in the protocols but I
878 mean...
879 Arthur TOPHAM: Well it's because you're not able to extrapolate because you think it's
880 a fantasy something like this going on.
881
882 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
883 Arthur TOPHAM: If you did enough research, as I have done...
884
885 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
886 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and studied enough history as I have done, and I'm not talking about
887 history written by the Jews I'm talking about other sources of history ...
888
889 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
890 Arthur TOPHAM: ...you will find out.
891
892 Det/Cst. WILSON: So other sources of history, what, what, where will I go to find other
893 sources of history? Because it's my understanding from your website
894 if I went to regular places...
895 Arthur TOPHAM: You could have come out and just spent a few weeks at my library
896 and read.
897
898 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah but your library is not exactly accessible to the public...
899 Arthur TOPHAM: No.
900
901 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...you know what I mean? Urn your website is.
902 Arthur TOPHAM: That's because I've spent the last twenty five years collecting it.
903
904 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
905 Arthur TOPHAM: You know, and it's not an easy task to find a lot of this material,
906 because who controls our publishing industry? Who controls all the
907 printing and the magazines? And who controls all of the media?
908
909 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mhm.
910 Arthur TOPHAM: Your good friends here who think I'm promoting hatred towards the
911 Jewish population.
912
913 Det/Cst. WILSON: So the Jews control all that so therefore-
914 Arthur TOPHAM: They control that. They control what you're doing. They created the
915 Unit you're working for. And they created the newspaper you read in

916 the morning. They created the television news you watch at night.
917 They created the pharmaceuticals you take. They create the booze
918 you drink. They create all of it.
919
920 Det/Cst. WILSON: But I don't understand, if they create all of it- like it's not a real bad
921 world what I live in.
922 Arthur TOPHAM: Hmm?
923
924 Det/Cst. WILSON: It's not a bad place that I live in, so whoever creates it or not it doesn't
925 seem to be a bad thing.
926 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh well yeah not where you're living. Tell that to the Palestinians.
927
928 Det/Cst. WILSON: Weill understand there's a conflict there but I mean ...
929 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
930
931 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...there's a conflict on both sides. I don't, I don't...
932 Arthur TOPHAM: No no no, read the Protocols.
933
934 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
935 Arthur TOPHAM: They planned all of it back then. Like I said, you've got ...
936
937 Det/Cst. WILSON: They plan- they planned, they planned a...
938 Arthur TOPHAM: They planned everything!
939
940 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
941 Arthur TOPHAM: Anything that you are seeing in the twentieth century is all -that's
942 what I say- it's like a roadmap. If you knew your history...
943
944 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
945 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and you compared it to what's projected in there, it's not just a story.
946
947 Det/Cst. WILSON: To what end though? Maybe I don't understand to what end?
948 Arthur TOPHAM: To what end?
949
950 Det/Cst. WILSON: To, for them to what end? Like why, why are they doing this?
951 Arthur TOPHAM: Well... we'll talk about that another time. (Laughs)
952
953 Det/Cst. WILSON: But I also.....
954 Arthur TOPHAM: I don't want to give - I don't want to give, you know people pay me
955 money for...
956
957 Det/Cst. WILSON: You don't want to tell the ending?

958 Arthur TOPHAM: ...for, for tutorials like this, I don't want to give away the ending.
959 (Laughs)
960
961 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well you, you do have, you do have other books that are written by
962 other people that are urn interesting, Eustice MULLEN's book.
963 Arthur TOPHAM: He has a number of books yeah.
964
965 Det/Cst. WILSON: That's, but the one that's on your bo- the interesting one that's on your
966 website is The Biological Jew.
967 Arthur TOPHAM: Mmhm.
968
969 Det/Cst. WILSON: And I read that.
970 Arthur TOPHAM: Mmhm.
971
972 Det/Cst. WILSON: And essentially he goes on to equate the Jewish population, the Jews,
973 Zionists, with parasites on society. Like I don't quite understand how...
974 Arthur TOPHAM: You don't know what a host parasite relationship is?
975
976 Det/Cst. WILSON: Weill don't understand how they control stuff and, and they become
977 a parasite, how that, a parasite just lives off it and it dies, it doesn't
978 control anything. Like what a host parasite is? Maybe I don't, maybe
979 I only understand what a parasite is, I see a parasite as -
980 Arthur TOPHAM: Well a parasite can't survive without a host.
981
982 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right. But how does it- and one, and one side you're telling me that
983 the Jews controls the world, but then on the other side they're, they're
984 a parasite that's, that's reliant on us. So I don't understand how that's
985 possible. If they're controlling it they don't need to be reliant on us.
986 How do they rely on us? And I don't understand what Mr. MULLEN's
987 direction is when it comes to that. It's a conflict in my mind, so I'm a
988 bit confused.
989 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah. Well you've got me off track, I did - my, you know that's
990 probably enough for tonight. I really am tired.
991
992 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well do you, do you agree with Mr. MULLEN?
993 Arthur TOPHAM: Hey?
994
995 Det/Cst. WILSON: Like do you agree with Mr. MULLEN that that's, (indecipherable)?
996 Arthur TOPHAM: No you, you don't know, you don't know....
997
998 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't know what?
999 Arthur TOPHAM: ...Terry you don't understand the big picture yet.

1000 Det/Cst. WILSON: No I don't.
1001 Arthur TOPHAM: Until you do you're gonna just have to work at it.
1002
1003 Det/Cst. WILSON: So how do I find out the big picture? Do I read things like Eustice
1004 MULLEN's on your website? Or whose the other ladies' name,
1005 Elizabeth ...urn...
1006 Arthur TOPHAM: DILLING?
1007
1008 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...Elizabeth DILLING on your, there's another book on your website
1009 there, are those the places I go to to get enlightened to?
1010 Arthur TOPHAM: Well there's, there's some things, the website is full of stuff today.
1011
1012 Det/Cst. WILSON: Why do you keep pointing at the recorder, I don't understand?
1013 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah I'm, I'm finished talking in order words Terry.
1014
1015 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. Well have a seat here for a second.
1016 Arthur TOPHAM: (Laughs)
1017
1018 Det/Cst. WILSON: Have a seat here, I gotta make sure I got your document, I'm gonna
1019 send somebody go down to get your property out of cells, and we'll
1020 give it to you here so urn, and make sure that your wife - she, she's
1021 gonna come and pick you up.
1022 Arthur TOPHAM: I have no idea.
1023
1024 Det/Cst. WILSON: No, no she is.
1025 Arthur TOPHAM: You tell me.
1026
1027 Det/Cst. WILSON: We've, we've had conversation with her, so we're waiting...
1028 Arthur TOPHAM: Was she at home while, while you guys were out there?
1029
1030 Det/Cst. WILSON: No no. She stayed with another lady who came actually to the front
1031 counter with her, and we explained everything that was going on. She
1032 seemed to be ...
1033 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1034
1035 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...like fine with it because-
1036 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah okay.
1037
1038 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...not fine but I mean, we tried to make it best as possible right?
1039 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1040

1041 DeVCst. WILSON: So just relax there for a second, I'm just gonna make sure that that's
1042 all copasetic and I'll be right back okay?
1043 Arthur TOPHAM: I shall not try to escape.
1044
1045 DeVCst. WILSON: And, and urn after that's done I'm gonna give you some documents
1046 about when you have to go to court and all that sort stuff. So sit tight.
1047 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1048
1049 (DeVCst. WILSON exits the room)
1050
1051 Arthur TOPHAM: Peace officer. (Long pause) Seventeen.
1052
1053 (DeVCst. WILSON returns approximately three minutes later)
1054
1055
1056 DeVCst. WILSON: Sorry about that. Urn so they just made a call to your wife to make
1057 sure she's coming down to pick you up. Again we're just trying to be
1058 humane, we weren't going to allow you just kick you out the front door
1059 so we're gonna make sure that you got a way home. She volunteered
1060 that she'd wanna come down and pick you up so we made that
1061 arrangement. If she didn't want to do that we would make sure that
1062 you got back without..
1063 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1064
1065 DeVCst. WILSON: ...because Cottonwood is a uh, decent distance to say the last, it's
1066 way out there.
1067 Arthur TOPHAM: Considering the night before I had to walk out ten kilometres.
1068
1069 DeVCst. WILSON: You had to walk ten kilometres, why?
1070 Arthur TOPHAM: Because the truck ran out of fuel. Nobody on the road.
1071
1072 DeVCst. WILSON: So the only thing I haven't uh, haven't talked to you about...
1073 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh I went and erased all of the stuff on that thing there for you while
1074 you were here. (Laughs)
1075
1076 DeVCst. WILSON: Erased all of it off? Perfect, there's lots of way to record it so ... Urn
1077 the, the one thing that I did talk to you - but you did talk to Mr.
1078 CHRISTY about, was your urn, was your firearms at your house.
1079 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1080
1081 DeVCst. WILSON: And you were quickly gonna give me an explanation in cells, and then
1082 we got you in the room to uh...

1083 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah I've been advised not to go any- anywhere with it, so we won't
1084 discuss that.
1085
1086 Det/Cst. WILSON: So just so you know from us, there's four firearms from your house,
1087 and a pellet gun or something like that, two of those firearms were
1088 loaded. Okay? Which is contrary, contrary to the code, right, they say
1089 it can't be loaded. Urn and they were in your bedroom, from my
1090 understanding.
1091 Arthur TOPHAM: That's right.
1092
1093 Det/Cst. WILSON: No trigger locks, no nothing like that. Urn is, is there an explanation
1094 why they're like that?
1095 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah there is. Yeah.
1096
1097 Det/Cst. WILSON: Can you tell me what that explanation is?
1098 Arthur TOPHAM: No.
1099
1100 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
1101 Arthur TOPHAM: I figured you'd probably figure it out. Have you ever lived in the
1102 country?
1103
1104 Det/Cst. WILSON: I have lived in the country
1105 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah?
1106
1107 Det/Cst. WILSON: But when I lived in the country, although I might have firearms in the
1108 house I don't leave them loaded, because I'm proficient enough that
1109 I could load them...
1110 Arthur TOPHAM: Fast enough eh?
1111
1112 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...well would think so. And I think that's essentially why the law is set
1113 out the way it is. Because they assume if you're using it to kill
1114 animals, you could put the bullets in the gun you know if you had a
1115 trespassing grizzly bear or something like that. You wouldn't need 'em
1116 loaded on your bedroom floor. You know what I mean? So that's,
1117 that's the issue I have. It's pretty black and white in the code.
1118 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1119
1120 Det/Cst. WILSON: It essentially says...
1121 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah I know.
1122
1123 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...you can't do that.
1124 Arthur TOPHAM: I'm sure it is yeah.

1125 DeVCst. WILSON: Right?
1126 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah
1127
1128 DeVCst. WILSON: So I, I don't understand.
1129 Arthur TOPHAM: Everything in the book is usually pretty clear. But life is not always
1130 like the book.
1131
1132 DeVCst. WILSON: And that book...
1133 Arthur TOPHAM: As you probably know.
1134
1135 DeVCst. WILSON: ...and that book for me it is, it's pretty black and white for me.
1136 Arthur TOPHAM: Mhm, yeah yeah.
1137
1138 DeVCst. WILSON: Right? You know what, if you promote hatred it's against the law.
1139 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh yeah -if I promote it. I don't promote hatred.
1140
1141 DeVCst. WILSON: (indecipherable) Oh I wasn't saying, I wasn't saying you. What I'm
1142 telling you is, if you promote hatred that's a law that, that you're
1143 contravening ...
1144 Arthur TOPHAM: Mhm.
1145
1146 DeVCst. WILSON: ...and that's what you're doing in this case. You contr- you contravene
1147 the law of wilful promotion of hatred.
1148 Arthur TOPHAM: Well I haven't contravened any law. You're assuming that I've
1149 contravened the law, or somebody is. Harry, Harry ABRAMS from,
1150 from Victoria who sent you guys on me, is assuming...
1151
1152 DeVCst. WILSON: Well (indecipherable)
1153 Arthur TOPHAM: He's the same guy that complains to the Humans Rights Commission.
1154
1155 DeVCst. WILSON: Well nobody said (indecipherable) just so you understand the way
1156 police work.
1157 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh yeah.
1158
1159 DeVCst. WILSON: Somebody complains to us, we do an investigation.
1160 Arthur TOPHAM: Well somebody complained to the Human Rights Commission, and
1161 they filed a Section 13 complaint against me.
1162
1163 DeVCst. WILSON: Mhm.
1164 Arthur TOPHAM: Same thing. Harry ABRAMS.
1165

1166 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. So what I'm going to give you is a couple of documents here
1167 okay. There's multiple pages here but they're all essentially the same
1168 document, they're all the same document, we gotta make three copies
1169 of everything, just so you know.
1170 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1171
1172 Det/Cst. WILSON: And I'll, and one of these copies with this I'm gonna give you so you
1173 can have with you.
1174 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1175
1176 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay so you can take it with you. So this is a Promise to Appear. I'm
1177 just gonna put something in here. So May the 16'h today. So what
1178 this is, this is a Promise to Appear, urn I'll take this copy because that
1179 just says I served it you. Urn Promise to Appear means it gives you
1180 a court date, so I'm gonna explain it to you. Essentially this is you up
1181 here, this is where you live.
1182 Arthur TOPHAM: Mmhm.
1183
1184 Det/Cst. WILSON: This is your phone number, this is your date of birth. Okay? It says
1185 between April 28, 2011 and May 14, 2012 in Quesnel, British
1186 Columbia, you wilfully promoted hatred, contrary to section 319.2.
1187 Arthur TOPHAM: From April to May?
1188
1189 Det/Cst. WILSON: April 2011 to May 2012, so a year and a month.
1190 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh. Oh.
1191
1192 Det/Cst. WILSON: So that's the...
1193 Arthur TOPHAM: How come such a short period?
1194
1195 Det/Cst. WILSON: Because that's the time frame that we looked at, this is when...
1196 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh this is when you got the complaint?
1197
1198 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...we got the complaint in April, and this is the, that's the time frame
1199 we looked at.
1200 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah okay.
1201
1202 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay? So these are, this is the offence and this is the section and the
1203 code, 319.2. Okay. So on the 9'h of October 2012 at nine o'clock in
1204 the morning you have to go to the Quesnel police - uh Quesnel Court
1205 house at 350 Barlow Ave. Okay that's your first appearance date.
1206 Arthur TOPHAM: October.
1207

1208 DeUCst. WILSON: That's the date they gave us. Okay?
1209 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh gives me time to dig up a few numbers.
1210
1211 Det/Cst. WILSON: 'Cause what, what happens now in the process is that for this charge
1212 here the Attorney General of British Columbia has to approve that
1213 charge. So we present a package to the Attorney General, the
1214 Attorney General says yes.
1215 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh I'm sure, Shirley's not gonna go for that.
1216
1217 Det/Cst. WILSON: She's the Solicitor General.
1218 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh Attorney General, who's that?
1219
1220 DeUCst. WILSON: Attorney General- oh maybe she is the Attorney General now. So
1221 she...
1222 Arthur TOPHAM: I think she is the Attorney General. (Laughs)
1223
1224 Det/Cst. WILSON: She, she's the one, so it goes to the Attorney General, the Attorney
1225 General approves the charges and then we go in the process.
1226 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1227
1228 Det/Cst. WILSON: So we created a package for her that she's going to review, her
1229 designate is gonna review.
1230 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1231
1232 Det/Cst. WILSON: That's how it's gonna go. So, on October the 9th you have to show up
1233 for court. There's the address for the court house, I think you know
1234 where it is, on Barlow Street.
1235 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah I was there on an attempted murder charge back in '71.
1236
1237 Det/Cst. WILSON: You?
1238 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1239
1240 Det/Cst. WILSON: Or a witness?
1241 Arthur TOPHAM: Hmm?
1242
1243 Det/Cst. WILSON: Were you a witness, or an accused?
1244 Arthur TOPHAM: No same, same sorta thing. Guy tried to kill me, and when I ...
1245
1246 Det/Cst. WILSON: You're the victim?
1247 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and then they turned around and charged me with trying to kill him.
1248
1249 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh okay.

1250 Arthur TOPHAM: But then I guess the ballistics showed that it was actually him trying
1251 to kill me so they let, let me off.
1252

1253 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh perfect. So also on the same date, the reason we put it on the
1254 same date is just to make it for advantageous for you, is that on
1255 October 9th. 2012 at eight o'clock in the morning, so an hour before
1256 your court date...

1257 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1258

1259 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...you gotta show up here, they're gonna take your fingerprints and
1260 photograph. Okay?

1261 Arthur TOPHAM: Then?
1262

1263 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
1264 Arthur TOPHAM: Why so long from then- now?
1265

1266 Det/Cst. WILSON: Just because it's more convenient, that it's the same day of your
1267 courthouse so you don't screw up two dates, okay?

1268 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh I thought they had to do that when they arrest you?
1269

1270 Det/Cst. WILSON: No we just have to do it sometime in the process.
1271 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh I see, okay.
1272

1273 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay? So in the process. So this is more of a convenient date for
1274 you. Okay?

1275 Arthur TOPHAM: That'll give me a chance to shave.
1276

1277 Det/Cst. WILSON: So if you understand that, essentially what this part says is that if you
1278 breach either one of these conditions, which means you don't go to
1279 court or you don't get your fingerprints, you can - that can be an
1280 additional criminal charge.

1281 Arthur TOPHAM: You (indecipherable-laughing)
1282

1283 Det/Cst. WILSON: Uh it's an additional charge. What the courts do with you I don't know.
1284 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah. Yeah okay.
1285

1286 Det/Cst. WILSON: So this is today's date, and I'm gonna sign it here. I need you to sign
1287 it here. You don't have to sign it if you don't want.

1288 Arthur TOPHAM: No my lawyer said don't sign anything.
1289

1290 Det/Cst. WILSON: All that means is that you received this document, it doesn't mean
1291 anything, but because we're on audio and video tape and I'm

1292 explaining it to you, I don't think there's any issue about you receiving
1293 the document. Okay?
1294 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah as long as you don't lose that, screw that thing up.
1295
1296 DeVCst. WILSON: I won't screw that thing up. So I'm gonna give you this copy here,
1297 okay?
1298 ArthurTOPHAM: Okay.
1299
1300 DeVCst. WILSON: There's two other copies I need to sign, and if you wish to sign them
1301 please tell me.
1302 Arthur TOPHAM: No my uh, my uh...
1303
1304 DeVCst. WILSON: I just have to write in the fingerprint date.
1305 Arthur TOPHAM: ...my legal advice is not to sign anything so I'll just...
1306
1307 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay.
1308 Arthur TOPHAM: ...listen to, listen to that. But these are the same thing eh?
1309
1310 DeVCst. WILSON: They're exactly the same, yeah. Just unfortunately they have to be in
1311 triplicate. Although the days of triplicate -I have no idea why they are.
1312 So would you like to sign there? Okay. Same thing here, I'm just
1313 gonna put in the fingerprint date is October the 9th, 2012 at eight
1314 o'clock in the morning, Quesnel RCMP detachment.
1315 Arthur TOPHAM: You already have fingerprints. I guess you don't have, you probably
1316 don't have old records eh?
1317
1318 DeVCst. WILSON: We do but for every, every new charge we take new prints.
1319 Arthur TOPHAM: New prints.
1320
1321 DeVCst. WILSON: It's the process we do.
1322 Arthur TOPHAM: The old ones were in '66 or something anyways, they wouldn't be,
1323 they (indecipherable)
1324
1325 DeVCst. WILSON: In '66? What happened in '66?
1326 Arthur TOPHAM: (Laughs)
1327
1328 DeVCst. WILSON: Okay you don't have to tell me. This is, this is another document,
1329 they're all the same.
1330 Arthur TOPHAM: Didn't quite make it through the East end of Vancouver without
1331 running into a fire hydrant drunk out of my mind.
1332

1333 Det/Cst WILSON: So this is an Undertaking to a Police Officer. So this is your Promise
1334 to Appear to go to court.
1335 Arthur TOPHAM: okay.
1336
1337 Det/Cst. WILSON: These are conditions that I'm placing you on on your release. Okay?
1338 Arthur TOPHAM: These are conditions you what?
1339
1340 Det/Cst. WILSON: I'm gonna put you on, for your release.
1341 Arthur TOPHAM: (Laughs)
1342
1343 Det/Cst. WILSON: So what, I'm gonna explain this to you okay?
1344 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay yeah, go ahead.
1345
1346 Det/Cst. WILSON: So this is you, this is your address, this is where you live- British
1347 Columbia, your date of birth up here.
1348 ArthurTOPHAM: Okay.
1349
1350 Det/Cst. WILSON: Again the same dates, Quesnel, B.C., Wilful Promotion of Hatred,
1351 319.2 of the Code, same as that document there.
1352 Arthur TOPHAM: Right.
1353
1354 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay?
1355 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1356
1357 Det/Cst. WILSON: So you're released on a Promise To Appear.
1358 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1359
1360 Det/Cst WILSON: Okay? Where it's checked is what we do. So you can't, you have to
1361 abstain from communicating directly or indirectly with Richard
1362 Warman and Harry ABRAMS. There's two complainants in the, in the
1363 file.
1364 Arthur TOPHAM: What about Ryan ESCROWS (phonetic spelling)?
1365
1366 Det/Cst. WILSON: These are the two complainants in the file, these are the people you
1367 can't communicate with.
1368 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh okay.
1369
1370 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
1371 Arthur TOPHAM: Because this fellow here he's always writing under a different name.
1372
1373 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.

1374 Arthur TOPHAM: So if I write to him under a different name does that mean I'm writing
1375 to him?
1376
1377 Det/Cst. WILSON: If you know it's him yes it does.
1378 Arthur TOPHAM: Well how do I- he doesn't acknowledge it.
1379
1380 Det/Cst. WILSON: You just told me he wrote under a different name.
1381 Arthur TOPHAM: Well yeah but he won't admit to it.
1382
1383 Det/Cst. WILSON: So who else, what other name would it be?
1384 Arthur TOPHAM: Brian ESCROWS.
1385
1386 Det/Cst. WILSON: Brian - so if it's the same person and you know it to be Harry
1387 ABRAMS then don't write to him.
1388 Arthur TOPHAM: Well I'm assuming it's him, I don't know for sure. He's never
1389 acknowledged it.
1390
1391 Det/Cst. WILSON: That's gonna get you into a breach. Okay?
1392 Arthur TOPHAM: No I'm not interested in talking to either one of 'em.
1393
1394 Det/Cst. WILSON: So you can't, you can't communicate.
1395 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1396
1397 Det/Cst. WILSON: You also can't possess any firearms.
1398 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah okay.
1399
1400 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay we have the firearms from your house right now.
1401 Arthur TOPHAM: You took 'em?
1402
1403 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah we have 'em.
1404 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay. Yeah.
1405
1406 Det/Cst. WILSON: There's four of 'em and a pellet gun, um and so that process as well.
1407 Arthur TOPHAM: I thought you said you couldn't find the other two.
1408
1409 Det/Cst. WILSON: No we found all four.
1410 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh you did eh.
1411
1412 Det/Cst. WILSON: Just two were loaded and two were unloaded.
1413 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh yeah. Yeah. No I thought- yeah.
1414

1415 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah, so you can't have any firearms and if you do possess any
1416 firearms outside the ones we take, you have to turn them over to me.
1417 ArthurTOPHAM: Ohforsure.
1418
1419 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay? And that's...
1420 Arthur TOPHAM: But I don't. No I got those from...
1421
1422 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. So one thing here, this is the last condition, is that you comply
1423 with the following: you cannot access the internet or be in possession
1424 of a device that would access, be capable of accessing the internet
1425 except in the course of lawful employment.
1426 Arthur TOPHAM: So no posting to the radicalpress website?
1427
1428 Det/Cst. WILSON: No posting to the radicalweb because that's not your lawful
1429 employment.
1430 Arthur TOPHAM: Hmm?
1431
1432 Det/Cst. WILSON: That's not your lawful employment.
1433 Arthur TOPHAM: No. Well, that's not necessarily true.
1434
1435 Det/Cst. WILSON: It's not your employment.
1436 Arthur TOPHAM: I get a lot of donations from writing on that website. As a matter of
1437 fact I survived for quite a bit of time while Harry and, and the crew
1438 there were taking me to court. That was my only means of...
1439
1440 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
1441 Arthur TOPHAM: ...of, of employment, was writing and getting donations.
1442
1443 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah, you're a miner by trade?
1444 Arthur TOPHAM: But I'm not doing that now.
1445
1446 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah you're a miner by trade.
1447 Arthur TOPHAM: I'm, I'm a, I'm a miner now...
1448
1449 Det/Cst. WILSON: If you...
1450 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and that is my business.
1451
1452 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah. So for example if you, on the internet...
1453 Arthur TOPHAM: Well I'm a miner too but I also run the Quesnel Cariboo Sentinel
1454 website.
1455
1456 Det/Cst. WILSON: Is that employment?

1457 Arthur TOPHAM: Hmm?
1458
1459 Det/Cst. WILSON: You make money off that?
1460 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1461
1462 Det/Cst. WILSON: So the Car- Cariboo Sentinel?
1463 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1464
1465 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
1466 Arthur TOPHAM: But I don't promote any of this stuff here that Harry and um what's his
1467 name are ...
1468
1469 Det/Cst. WILSON: Because what I can tell you is that your employment is that you're a
1470 miner. The Cariboo Sentinel is what, is an online newspaper?
1471 Arthur TOPHAM: It is.
1472
1473 Det/Cst. WILSON: How do you make funds from an online newspaper?
1474 Arthur TOPHAM: Sameway.
1475
1476 Det/Cst. WILSON: Same way as what?
1477 Arthur TOPHAM: Weill was selling advertising or donations.
1478
1479 Det/Cst. WILSON: I never seen you sell an advertisement on the Cariboo Sentinel yet.
1480 Arthur TOPHAM: You haven't?
1481
1482 Det/Cst. WILSON: I haven't seen advertising on there yet.
1483 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1484
1485 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay?
1486 Arthur TOPHAM: But that's not because I haven't tried.
1487
1488 Det/Cst. WILSON: You can correct me if I'm wrong but...
1489 Arthur TOPHAM: You could, if you look there ...
1490
1491 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...there's no advertising right?
1492 Arthur TOPHAM: ...you'll see a, a donation button.
1493
1494 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mhm. Donation's not employment. You get paid by somebody,
1495 donations aren't employment.
1496 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay you're looking at it that way, okay.
1497
1498

1499 Det/Cst. WILSON: You're not receiving a wage.
1500 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah okay I getcha. I getcha.
1501
1502 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay?
1503 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay. But as long as I can do my mining business that's fine.
1504
1505 Det/Cst. WILSON: We're not gonna interfere with that.
1506 Arthur TOPHAM: And, and also running the CMA website.
1507
1508 Det/Cst. WILSON: What's the CMA website?
1509 Arthur TOPHAM: That's the Cariboo Mining Association.
1510
1511 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
1512 Arthur TOPHAM: I'm the Administrator for that, that's part of the mining business.
1513
1514 Det/Cst. WILSON: I'll give you that. If you're ...
1515 Arthur TOPHAM: (indecipherable)
1516
1517 Det/Cst. WILSON: If all of a sudden you're posting hate on it, I'm gonna have a problem.
1518 Okay? But what I'm gonna tell you is because You're a miner by
1519 trade...
1520 Arthur TOPHAM: I, I don't post hate Mr. WILSON.
1521
1522 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah you do.
1523 Arthur TOPHAM: You assume I post.
1524
1525 Det/Cst. WILSON: No I'm investigator, I know you post it.
1526 Arthur TOPHAM: No you don't.
1527
1528 Det/Cst. WILSON: So what I'm gonna tell you...
1529 Arthur TOPHAM: You're doing the same thing, you're doing the same thing that the, that
1530 the, that the Commission was doing.
1531
1532 Det/Cst. WILSON: Which is what?
1533 Arthur TOPHAM: And they actually changed the wording.
1534
1535 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well...
1536 Arthur TOPHAM: They kept saying 'Radicalpress is promoting, is a hate promoting
1537 website or whatever'. You can't assume that. I haven't been to court,
1538 nobody's proven that I've been doing it.
1539

1540 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...so I'll give you the facts that I have grounds to believe you're
1541 promoting hate, how's that?
1542 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, go for it. That's...
1543
1544 Det/Cst. WILSON: I'll change my semantics, I have no problem with that.
1545 Arthur TOPHAM: ...yeah.
1546
1547 Det/Cst. WILSON: I have grounds to believe.
1548 Arthur TOPHAM: Well there's a difference there though.
1549
1550 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah I'll give you that.
1551 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1552
1553 Det/Cst. WILSON: We have grounds to believe that. Okay?
1554 Arthur TOPHAM: You're just assuming that based on your own information and your
1555 own biased information but yeah okay.
1556
1557 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. So you...
1558 Arthur TOPHAM: But I do need those two sites, the other ones, you know...
1559
1560 Det/Cst. WILSON: You can't access the internet except for employment.
1561 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1562
1563 Det/Cst. WILSON: So you're a min- you're a CMA which is the Canadian Miners
1564 Association is it?
1565 Arthur TOPHAM: The Cariboo Miners Association.
1566
1567 Det/Cst. WILSON: The Cariboo, sorry Cariboo Mining Association, and to access your
1568 employment as a miner.
1569 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh yeah because I've gotta go online.
1570
1571 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
1572 Arthur TOPHAM: Most of it's online.
1573
1574 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't have a Jot of concern with that. But you go outside of that,
1575 that's when, that's when there could be concern, right?
1576 Arthur TOPHAM: Go outside of it in what sense? Do you mean I can't...
1577
1578 Det/Cst. WILSON: You, you start posting on radicalpress again.
1579 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh no.
1580
1581 Det/Cst. WILSON: That's a condition.

1582 Arthur TOPHAM: Obviously not, no.
1583
1584 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah. You create a different website...
1585 Arthur TOPHAM: That's what these guys have been trying to stop me from doing since
1586 2007.
1587
1588 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...you create another website that is of the same vein- shall we say,
1589 of radicalpress, then I'm gonna have a problem with that
1590 Arthur TOPHAM: Well there's already one up there like that.
1591
1592 Det/Cst. WILSON: Which is what?
1593 Arthur TOPHAM: Are you not aware of it?
1594
1595 Det/Cst. WILSON: The Yahoo Chat one you have, the Anti-Zionist Canada one?
1596 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1597
1598 Det/Cst. WILSON: That's a chat urn, a message board or urn how do you want to say it?
1599 Arthur TOPHAM: It's a Yahoo group.
1600
1601 Det/Cst. WILSON: A Yahoo group.
1602 ArthurTOPHAM: Yeah.
1603
1604 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah I know, and I know it's the quick button on the top of your uh...
1605 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1606
1607 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...on the top there yeah. Yeah you can't be posting on that.
1608 Arthur TOPHAM: Well have you been on it?
1609
1610 Det/Cst. WILSON: I have.
1611 Arthur TOPHAM: Well what's wrong with it?
1612
1613 Det/Cst. WILSON: And I understa-1 understand that you're the, the moderator of it.
1614 Arthur TOPHAM: I am, yeah I create it.
1615
1616 Det/Cst. WILSON: It's, it's, it's- what do you mean what's wrong with it?
1617 Arthur TOPHAM: Well what's wrong with it?
1618
1619 Det/Cst. WILSON: Radicalpress is my concern.
1620 Arthur TOPHAM: No not radicalpress, what's wrong with the Anti-Zionist Canada one?
1621
1622 Det/Cst. WILSON: It would be contravention of your condition.
1623 Arthur TOPHAM: Why, it's not radicalpress?

1624 Det/Cst. WILSON: Because it's not your employment.
1625 Arthur TOPHAM: (Sighs) Okay.
1626
1627 Det/Cst. WILSON: The Anti-Zionist Canada is not your employment.
1628 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1629
1630 Det/Cst. WILSON: You're a miner by trade.
1631 Arthur TOPHAM: So I can't, I can't uh, okay. But I mean people still post on it, I don't
1632 have any control over that.
1633
1634 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well you're the moderator of it aren't you?
1635 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah but if I can't go on there I can't moderate it can I?
1636
1637 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right, so if you're not moderating it that's fine. If other people sorta
1638 take it over- we'll deal with those other people next or-
1639 Arthur TOPHAM: Well no I don't mean they'll take over but I mean, you know it's got
1640 members and they post on there ...
1641
1642 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
1643 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and somebody else posts.
1644
1645 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
1646 Arthur TOPHAM: I only moderate it if somebody comes on spreading hatred or
1647 something and I have to get rid of them, or else that type of thing.
1648
1649 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
1650 Arthur TOPHAM: Generally it just operates on it's own.
1651
1652 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well if it operates on it's own there's no reason for you to be on it.
1653 Arthur TOPHAM: But it, but like I say I mean if, if people are posting on there I don't
1654 have to post on there myself. But uh if yeah, it would be some you
1655 know, it would be - well we'll just leave it that way. But I'm just
1656 thinking you know because it is not going to stop people from posting
1657 or anything. You know they'll just wonder why I, why all of a sudden
1658 I'm not posting, but I'm sure there's other ways that they'll find that out
1659 anyways ...
1660
1661 Det/Cst. WILSON: Probably.
1662 Arthur TOPHAM: ...so I won't worry about it.
1663
1664 Det/Cst. WILSON: So unless it's for your employment, you're a miner by trade, you can't
1665 access the internet. Is that clear?

1666 Arthur TOPHAM: You mean I can't browse?
1667
1668 Devest. WILSON: You can't ac- you, you can't access the internet unless it's for, unless
1669 it's for the purpose of your employment. If you're browsing mining
1670 equipment I don't have a big problem with that. If you're browsing the
1671 new edition of the Elders of Zion -I have a problem with that, because
1672 that's not for your employment. You can only use the internet...
1673 Arthur TOPHAM: Anything related to employment.
1674
1675 DeVest. WILSON: ...in the course of your employment.
1676 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1677
1678 DeVest. WILSON: Okay?
1679 Arthur TOPHAM: (indecipherable)
1680
1681 Devest. WILSON: I just want to make sure that's clear because that's, that's a bit of a
1682 convoluted condition so I wanna make sure it's clear for you.
1683 Arthur TOPHAM: Well it's, it's fairly clear. I mean I assumed right away that you'd you
1684 know, I don't really see how you can stop me. I haven't been proven
1685 guilty of anything yet.
1686
1687 DeVest. WILSON: Listen this is...
1688 Arthur TOPHAM: How can you set a condition saying that I can't access my own
1689 website?
1690
1691 DeVest. WILSON: ...because we set conditions to prevent a continuation of the offence.
1692 Arthur TOPHAM: There is no offence until it's been proven.
1693
1694 DeVest. WILSON: The offence is the fact that I have grounds to believe you reas-
1695 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah but who are you, you're not, you're not a Judge and a jury.
1696
1697 DeVest. WILSON: No I'm, I'm the officer in charge that's releasing you.
1698 Arthur TOPHAM: I understand that.
1699
1700 Devest. WILSON: So that's (indecipherable)
1701 Arthur TOPHAM: But you're jumping, you're judging and saying...
1702
1703 DeVest. WILSON: No.
1704 Arthur TOPHAM: ...that I'm operating a hate site and I can't access it.
1705

1747

1706 Det/Cst. WILSON: I can tell you that Mr., Mr. CHRISTIE will give you options if you don't
1707 feel this is a just release. Okay? And there are other sort of appeal-
1708 I guess we'll use the term of appeals...
1709 Arthur TOPHAM: Mhm.
1710
1711 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...to go through to if you don't think this is a just release and you can
1712 fight and...
1713 Arthur TOPHAM: Weill mean...
1714
1715 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...or, or discuss it.
1716 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1717
1718 Det/Cst. WILSON: Right?
1719 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1720
1721 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay you can go take this to court if you don't think it's a just release.
1722 Right? And Mr. CHRISTIE I'm sure...
1723 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1724
1725 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...will give you all the options.
1726 Arthur TOPHAM: Because I haven't signed it anyways, so whatever.
1727
1728 Det/Cst. WILSON: No.
1729 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah okay.
1730
1731 Det/Cst. WILSON: But just so you know, just because you sign it- doesn't mean that it's
1732 not in effect. Okay?
1733 Arthur TOPHAM: Well I'm assuming that you'd love it if I was to go on there, then you
1734 could throw me in jail with Jim and lock me up forever and that would
1735 be just what this fellow and this fellow would love to see.
1736
1737 Det/Cst. WILSON: What I'm gonna tell you is, that if you breach these four conditions -
1738 because there's only four conditions - if you breach any one of these
1739 conditions there is a uh...
1740 Arthur TOPHAM: Serious repercussions.
1741
1742 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...yeah you could go to jail, there's an additional criminal charge.
1743 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1744
1745 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay?
1746 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah. So I don't have any...
1747

1748 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
1749 Arthur TOPHAM: ...any reason to do that.
1750
1751 Det/Cst. WILSON: So what I'm...
1752 Arthur TOPHAM: I'm just questioning some of the things you're saying, you know
1753 because you, you're get-
1754
1755 Det/Cst. WILSON: About this document or about just... ..?
1756 Arthur TOPHAM: Well just about the way you present things. Like where you, you know
1757 you tell me that I'm, I'm promoting hate crimes.
1758
1759 Det/Cst. WILSON: I have reasonable grounds to believe you are promoting hatred.
1760 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, yeah.
1761
1762 Det/Cst. WILSON: You wilfully promoted hatred, contrary to Section 319.2 of the Code.
1763 Okay? So did you want to sign this?
1764 Arthur TOPHAM: No.
1765
1766 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. You do realize that not signing it doesn't mean that it's not in
1767 effect? This condition ...
1768 Arthur TOPHAM: That's...
1769
1770 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...these conditions are in effect.
1771 Arthur TOPHAM: (indecipherable) I hear you, that's what you're telling me.
1772
1773 Det/Cst. WILSON: There's a French version as well.
1774 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1775
1776 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay? So this is your, this is your copy okay. And then there's...
1777 Arthur TOPHAM: It'll give me a lot more time to focus on the mining.
1778
1779 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...there's two other copies that I'm going to keep with these two other
1780 copies of...
1781 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
1782
1783 Det/Cst. WILSON: ... of your thing.
1784 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1785
1786 Det/Cst. WILSON: Of your Promise to Appear.
1787
1788 (Knock at the door is heard)
1789

1790 Det/Cst. WILSON: Do, do you have any questions of me Mr. TOPHAM?
1791
1792 (Cst Kamiya returns property from Cells)
1793
1794 Det/Cst. WILSON: Does he need to sign something?
1795
1796 Cst Kamiya: To say that he got his effects back, that way we saved him from
1797 having...
1798
1799 Det/Cst. WILSON: Perfect
1800
1801 Cst Kamiya: Everything else is in his bag here.
1802
1803 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. You'll want the bag back right, so... Urn Mr. TOPHAM you
1804 have to sign...
1805 Arthur TOPHAM: My ring in there?
1806
1807 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah it's in that envelope.
1808 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay let me pick up my driver's license too.
1809
1810 Det/Cst. WILSON: You can go, yeah go through it and make sure you got everything.
1811 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh I know.
1812
1813 Det/Cst. WILSON: But essentially it says urn...
1814 Arthur TOPHAM: Effects returned.
1815
1816 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...effects returned.
1817 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1818
1819 Det/Cst. WILSON: Just sign right there and it says you've got 'em returned. Perfect. You
1820 can put your stuff on if you want. So do you have any questions of me
1821 (indecipherable)?
1822 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh I probably, I probably got a thousand for you but I'm not...
1823
1824 Det/Cst. WILSON: So...
1825 Arthur TOPHAM: ...I'm not going to bother with them right now.
1826
1827 Det/Cst. WILSON: But if you feel a need that you need to discuss this a little further with
1828 me...
1829 Arthur TOPHAM: If you've got a business card or something 1...
1830
1831 Det/Cst. WILSON: That's me right there.

1832 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
1833
1834 Oet/Cst. WILSON: Okay, that's my card, give me a phone call. Have Mr. CHRISTIE give
1835 me a phone call if he's got some concerns about stuff. Okay?
1836 Arthur TOPHAM: So why have they got that cross stuck up on that emblem there?
1837
1838 Oet/Cst. WILSON: What cross on what emblem?
1839 Arthur TOPHAM: Here.
1840
1841 Oet/Cst. WILSON: I'm, I'm a New Westminster policeman, member. It's an integrated
1842 unit in the province, so I'm a municipal member.
1843 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah but why have you got a cross in there?
1844
1845 Oet/Cst. WILSON: I don't know why I got cross, cross on where?
1846 Arthur TOPHAM: Isn't that a cross in the centre there?
1847
1848 Oet/Cst. WILSON: No it's not. It's uh, it's urn four different sections of that crest. It
1849 doesn't look very good on the card, so...
1850 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh.
1851
1852 Oet/Cst. WILSON: There's a plough in the corner, there's a boat in the corner, there's ...
1853 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh, it almost looks like a...
1854
1855 Det/Cst. WILSON: So it, it looks like a cross but it's not a cross.
1856 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah okay. Are you a Christian?
1857
1858 Det/Cst. WILSON: I am.
1859 Arthur TOPHAM: You are? Interesting.
1860
1861 Oet/Cst. WILSON: Why is that interesting?
1862 Arthur TOPHAM: Hey?
1863
1864 Oet/Cst. WILSON: Just happen to be a, a religious belief, I mean why is that interesting?
1865 Arthur TOPHAM: Well, some day you'll figure it out.
1866
1867 Oet/Cst. WILSON: We'll think I have figured it out, it's just something I believe.
1868 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah? Well that's good.
1869
1870 Det/Cst. WILSON: And I, I take it by the cross that you wear you are likewise?
1871 Arthur TOPHAM: Yes. Yes. Yes I am.
1872

1873 Det/Cst. WILSON: So one of those is yours rings and the other one is the forty seven -
1874 forty-six cents. (indecipherable)
1875 Arthur TOPHAM: Hey?
1876
1877 Det/Cst. WILSON: Your ring, ring's in that one. There it is.
1878 Arthur TOPHAM: There we go, right on. Thanks.
1879
1880 Det/Cst. WILSON: So do you have any questions of me during the, about the process
1881 that's gone on?
1882 Arthur TOPHAM: Well you've been pretty civil.
1883
1884 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay I hope so.
1885 Arthur TOPHAM: You know.
1886
1887 Det/Cst. WILSON: Do you think you've been treated- you know consider it's arrested-
1888 but you've been treated alright? You know I know...
1889 Arthur TOPHAM: No actually I haven't been. I have one major complaint. I haven't
1890 been able to have a shit since you put me in here.
1891
1892 Det/Cst. WILSON: But there's a bathroom right there.
1893 Arthur TOPHAM: There is yeah, and what are you supposed to do? Do you, do you
1894 have a shit and don't wipe your ass?
1895
1896 Det/Cst. WILSON: No I do.
1897 Arthur TOPHAM: You do? Well...
1898
1899 Det/Cst. WILSON: You can ask the guards for that.
1900 Arthur TOPHAM: ...a little bit- oh, yeah but nobody tells you that.
1901
1902 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
1903 Arthur TOPHAM: They just put you in there and, and what are you supposed to do, wipe
1904 your- you know, have a shit and wipe your ass, wash your ass in the
1905 thing there...
1906
1907 Det/Cst. WILSON: No no.
1908 Arthur TOPHAM: ...while somebody's sitting up there watching?
1909
1910 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't know.
1911 Arthur TOPHAM: That's pretty uncivilized as far as I can see.
1912
1913 Det/Cst. WILSON: I will, I will take that into, into consideration so... outside of that?
1914 Arthur TOPHAM: Outside of that the, I enjoyed the bed it was good, that's a nice ...

1915 Det/Cst. WILSON: Good.
1916 Arthur TOPHAM: No but I mean the... Harry will just be ecstatic tonight. He'll be writing
1917 all of his friends saying 'We got him finally, we got him, we got him!'.
1918 And WARMAN (phonetic spelling)- I don't even call him WARMAN,
1919 WARMOUSE is his name, you know. These guys have spent the last
1920 two thousand years trying to destroy our religion, and you like a Judas
1921 are out here like a, like, like one of their dogs chasing down people
1922 who are trying to defend the Christian religion. You ought to be
1923 ashamed of yourself.
1924
1925 Det/Cst. WILSON: Weill don't, I don't see how...
1926 Arthur TOPHAM: No you don't see because you're blind.
1927
1928 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...I don't see how I've done that.
1929 Arthur TOPHAM: You're blind that's why you don't see. Maybe you better start reading
1930 the Bible a little bit more, the New Testament.
1931
1932 Det/Cst. WILSON: What- reading the Bible a little bit more, like what part of the Bible
1933 should I be reading concerning that?
1934 Arthur TOPHAM: The New Testament.
1935
1936 Det/Cst. WILSON: But I don't think anything in the Bible talks about Harry ABRAMS
1937 targeting anybody, I don't think that says that in the Bible at all.
1938 Arthur TOPHAM: Well you're a good candidate for these what we call nowadays, the
1939 Christian Zionists. The ones that support what's going on in Israel,
1940 and one that supports the whole, this whole thing about the Chosen
1941 people and all of that stuff eh. There's a, there's a massive volume of
1942 them in the States now you know.
1943
1944 Det/Cst. WILSON: The Chosen people?
1945 Arthur TOPHAM: Self-Chosen I call'em.
1946
1947 Det/Cst. WILSON: Who are the Chosen people?
1948 Arthur TOPHAM: (indecipherable)
1949
1950 Det/Cst. WILSON: You said Christian Zionists, I don't understand who - are they the
1951 Chosen people, the Christian Zionists? I don't understand, I don't
1952 understand.
1953 Arthur TOPHAM: You're being facetious aren't you?
1954
1955 Det/Cst. WILSON: No no no. No honest to God.

1956 Arthur TOPHAM: You call yourself a Christian, and you call yourself a hate crimes
1957 investigator. ...
1958
1959 Det/Cst. WILSON: I do.
1960 Arthur TOPHAM: ...and you don't know what the Christian Zionists are?
1961
1962 Det/Cst. WILSON: Urn I guess I understand...
1963 Arthur TOPHAM: And you don't know what the Bible says about-?
1964
1965 Det/Cst. WILSON: Weill don't.
1966 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah okay, whatever. I mean there's a lot of nominal Christians
1967 around who call themselves Christians, but uh...that's about as far as
1968 it goes when it comes to understanding the teachings of Jesus.
1969 These have still got dust on, they're old these things.
1970
1971 Det/Cst. WILSON: So a phone call's been made to your wife, I'm assuming she's not too
1972 far away so she'll be right out there ready to go.
1973 Arthur TOPHAM: It's about twenty five minutes or something.
1974
1975 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah I don't know if she was from home though, she was with a friend
1976 of hers so I'm not too sure if she was very far or not.
1977 Arthur TOPHAM: She might've stayed with somebody in town here yeah, to be a little
1978 closer.
1979
1980 Det/Cst. WILSON: To be a little closer right, so...
1981 Arthur TOPHAM: Well, we've got the hens at home, the chickens and stuff too...
1982
1983 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
1984 Arthur TOPHAM: ...looked after there so maybe... Yeah, yeah it's interesting you know,
1985 people like you who, who are trained, I'm curious where you got all
1986 your information from, who it was. You know, who taught you.
1987
1988 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well. ...
1989 Arthur TOPHAM: Because you don't just become head of this without getting a lot of
1990 training by certain people...
1991
1992 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...well we take...
1993 Arthur TOPHAM: ...or certain groups. You know that's why I say, you know you've
1994 probably be trained by Jews to...
1995
1996 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't (indecipherable)

1997 Arthur TOPHAM: ...to recognize anti-Semitism and all this other bullshit that they try to
1998 lay on everybody, you know. I'm sure you've taken courses and
1999 courses and it's probably by Mr. COHEN or Mr. FINKELSTEIN or Mr.
2000 Whoever it is, you know.
2001
2002 Det/Cst. WILSON: Forty-six cents.
2003 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh it's in there? Oh.
2004
2005 Det/Cst. WILSON: Forty-six cents.
2006 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah, I might need that eh. We'll hope when you say your prayers
2007 at night... if you say your prayers at night...that you maybe ask for a
2008 little more understanding in this whole thing, when you keep saying to
2009 me 'Oh I don't understand this, and I don't understand that'. How old
2010 are you by the way, forty five?
2011
2012 Det/Cst. WILSON: Forty seven.
2013 Arthur TOPHAM: Forty seven eh?
2014
2015 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
2016 Arthur TOPHAM: That's the year I was born, forty seven. Well you know I guess it was
2017 about, took me 'til I was about fifty- no, I didn't really pick up on what
2018 was going on until about, until about 2001 or '2 or something like that.
2019
2020 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
2021 Arthur TOPHAM: I have been you know researching and writing and stuff, you know,
2022 and doing things you know since the sixties.
2023
2024 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
2025 Arthur TOPHAM: But it took that long before pieces finally fell in place.
2026
2027 Det/Cst. WILSON: Was there something, was there something that particular happened
2028 that sort of brought it to light or?
2029 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah actually.
2030
2031 Det/Cst. WILSON: (indecipherable)
2032 Arthur TOPHAM: It was a book that I read called the Controversy of Zion, by a British
2033 writer called Douglas REID.
2034
2035 Det/Cst. WILSON: Douglas REID, yeah.
2036 Arthur TOPHAM: You might read that.
2037
2038 Det/Cst. WILSON: Well it's on your website. It was on your website.

2039 Arthur TOPHAM: Well a link to, yeah.
2040
2041 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah okay.
2042 Arthur TOPHAM: If you go on there, there's a link to it's a...
2043
2044 Det/Cst. WILSON: It's a, it's a fairly large book right?
2045 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
2046
2047 Det/Cst. WILSON: He's a South African man wasn't he?
2048 Arthur TOPHAM: That's right- no no...
2049
2050 Det/Cst. WILSON: No no.
2051 Arthur TOPHAM: ...no he was British but he lived in South Africa ...
2052
2053 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay.
2054 Arthur TOPHAM: ...after the war, 'til he died.
2055
2056 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
2057 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah that, I mean that was the one that kind of put all the pieces
2058 together. After reading that it was almost virtually impossible not to
2059 see...
2060
2061 Det/Cst. WILSON: Mmhm.
2062 Arthur TOPHAM: ...you know the bigger plan of what's going on with these Zionists and,
2063 and their supporters.
2064
2065 Det/Cst. WILSON: Okay. Don't forget your suspenders. Is everything out of that bag?
2066 I don't want you to sort of...
2067 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh.
2068
2069 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...is everything out of there?
2070 Arthur TOPHAM: That's a good little bag, I could collect paydirt in there. Yeah that's all.
2071
2072 Det/Cst. WILSON: But I think I gotta return it though, just so you know I gotta return it.
2073 So, so you have your documents?
2074 Arthur TOPHAM: I got the documents.
2075
2076 Det/Cst. WILSON: Everything else urn, everything else that you -we at the scene you
2077 gave to your wife at the scene.
2078 Arthur TOPHAM: Yeah.
2079
2080 Det/Cst. WILSON: So that's the stuff you just showed up with

2081 Arthur TOPHAM: (indecipherable) yeah this is all my...
2082
2083 Det/Cst. WILSON: Oh and the only thing I do have is that blue uh thumb drive.
2084 Arthur TOPHAM: Oh go for it. Go for it.
2085
2086 Det/Cst. WILSON: That, that's the only thing that you're missing out of the whole thing,
2087 right? (indecipherable)
2088 Arthur TOPHAM: Well that's... fits in with all the other electronic devices and stuff.
2089
2090 Det/Cst. WILSON: Exactly, that's why we took it.
2091 Arthur TOPHAM: So did you also take my um, my password book for all...
2092
2093 Det/Cst. WILSON: Your password book?
2094 Arthur TOPHAM: ...yeah.
2095
2096 Det/Cst. WILSON: I'm not too sure. Again I wasn't there so I'm not too sure.
2097 Arthur TOPHAM: Because I can't, you know, that's another thing. I mean if you took
2098 that, that screws me too because you need your passwords to...
2099
2100 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah.
2101 Arthur TOPHAM: ...access everything and...
2102
2103 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't know. And, and I think the best thing to do, if there's a, an
2104 avenue on how you get some of your property back or how that works
2105 you're gonna have to talk to Mr. CHRISTIE about that. I can't give
2106 you advice on that because I'm not your lawyer so...
2107 Arthur TOPHAM: Mmhm.
2108
2109 Det/Cst. WILSON: ...I prefer Mr. CHRISTIE to...
2110 Arthur TOPHAM: No I wasn't asking advice as far as that went, I was just wondering
2111 what you may have known if they had taken that.
2112
2113 Det/Cst. WILSON: I don't know. I don't know.
2114 Arthur TOPHAM: I'll find out when I get home.
2115
2116 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah, okay.
2117 Arthur TOPHAM: So did they leave the place in shambles?
2118
2119 Det/Cst. WILSON: Did they leave- no, no no I don't think so.
2120 Arthur TOPHAM: No?
2121
2122 Det/Cst. WILSON: No.

2123 Arthur TOPHAM: I mean you're notorious for going in, or is that more of the drug guys
2124 go in and thrash people's places and then just leave it?
2125
2126 Det/Cst. WILSON: Yeah we don't, we don't, we don't thrash people's places. We look for
2127 the evidence and that's it, so...
2128 Arthur TOPHAM: I appreciate that.
2129
2130 Det/Cst. WILSON: No problem, no problem. I'm just gonna walk you out the front here.
2131 Arthur TOPHAM: Okay.
2132
2133 Det/Cst. WILSON: Just to your left here. I don't know if she's here yet.
2134
